The Principles for Responsible Management Education (PRME) is a United Nationssupported initiative founded in 2007 that aims to raise the profile of sustainability in their classrooms through Seven Principles focused on serving society and safeguarding our planet.

PRME engages business and management schools to ensure they provide future leaders with the skills needed to balance economic and sustainability goals, while drawing attention to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and aligning academic institutions with the work of the UN Global Compact. Driven by its mission to transform management education, PRME equips today's business students with the understanding and ability to deliver change tomorrow. As a voluntary initiative with over 800 signatories worldwide, PRME has become the largest organized relationship between the United Nations and management-related higher education institutions.



The PRME initiative was launched to nurture responsible leaders of the future. Never has this task been more important. Bold leadership and innovative thinking are needed to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

At the heart of Agenda 2030 are 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and 169 related targets that address the most important economic, social, environmental and governance challenges of our time. Letter of Commitment

Welcome from our Director of Social Responsibility, Professor Javed Siddiqui

We are pleased to welcome you to our third PRME SIP report. Social responsibility is one of the three core goals (alongside Research and Discovery; and Teaching and Learning) of the University of Manchester. The report outlines some of our important projects and invitation recent years and provides an update on how the Six Principles are being implemented in AMBS.

We were the first university to place social responsibility (SR) as a core goal in its identity and strategy. Our commitment to social responsibility is also recognised externally. For example, the 2023 Times Higher Education University Impact Rankings place the University of Manchester first in Europe and second in the world for social and environmental impact across its full range of functions of education, research, operations, and public engagement activity, using the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) as a framework.

AMBS, as an integrated school of The University of Manchester, recognises social responsibility as one of the three main pillars of our identity and strategy. We actively execute and participate in university-wide social responsibility projects and programmes, as well as formulating and implementing a social responsibility plan that capitalises on our school's strengths and possibilities. Our philosophy is that social responsibility should be completely integrated into all the functions and activities that we do as a business school. We also have a management system and structure to specifically lead, develop, and implement our social responsibility strategy.

This is led by our School Director for Social Responsibility, who Chairs a School Social Responsibility Committee and is also an integral member of the Senior Leadership Team of AMBS and the Faculty of Humanities Social Responsibility Operations Group. The School SR Committee includes Associate Heads of Social Responsibility from our four Divisions, a Professional Services SR lead, and leaders from our core functional departments.

We are fully committed to the PRME principles despite any challenges we face. In 2025, we unveiled our AMBS Ambitions, which articulate four key purposes: undertaking responsible and relevant research, developing curious global citizens, supporting and establishing organisations that create positive impact, and encouraging public and policy debate. Each of these purposes is grounded in our commitment to Social Responsibility. Our philosophy is clear: Social Responsibility should be fully integrated into every function and activity of the business school—from research and teaching to operations and community engagement.

The world faces unprecedented challenges—climate change, inequality, and technological disruption among them. Businesses are increasingly expected to address these issues, not exacerbate them. As educators, we have a responsibility to prepare graduates who understand

that profitability and purpose can coexist. Embedding Social Responsibility into our curriculum and research ensures that our students graduate as responsible leaders, equipped to make decisions that benefit both shareholders and society.

This year has been transformative for SR at AMBS. We launched our Ambition for Social Impact, a roadmap for embedding Social Responsibility across all aspects of school life. We measure societal impact using the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDG) —a global call to action on humanity's most pressing challenges—and our ambition focuses on four priority areas: research, learning and students, community engagement, and operations. To ensure accountability and leadership, we restructured Social Responsibility governance by updating the role of Associate Heads of Social Responsibility within each division. These roles now carry functional responsibilities in four critical areas: socially responsible research, socially responsible teaching, environmental sustainability, and partnerships, engagement, and wellbeing.
