Letter from the Dean

Iscte Business School is an internationally accredited business school that pioneered teaching management and business sciences in Portugal. The relationship with PRME started in 2011 when Iscte Business School became the first Portuguese Business School to subscribe to the Principles. The School has reinforced its commitment to PRME, becoming an Advanced Member in 2018, and by becoming part of the PRME Chapter Iberia Steering Committee in 2021. This report presents the status of the diverse activities in responsible management education for 2023.

This year, Iscte Business School marked a significant milestone within the PRME community by hosting the Responsible Management Education Research (RMER) Conference 2023 in September. It was also the inaugural year of Iscte Business School's participation as a PRME Champion school. Our institution continues to advance the Impactful Five (i5) initiative and promote the pedagogical adoption of playful learning for holistic development.

Following the PRME principles, the School has continued its serious approach to Sustainable Development Goals. We have been using them as a lens to analyze teaching and research as it continuously enhances its internal structures, policies, and processes. This commitment is reflected in the mission, values, and strategy of the Iscte Business School. In pursuing our mission of co-creating societal impact, we also held in 2023 the first Iscte Business School Sustainability Summit with the support of student groups, making it a truly student-driven event. Also, as members of the EFMD and committed to Ethics, Responsibility and Sustainability, we are actively engaged in the EQUIS accreditation process and have achieved eligibility this year.

Our goal as a business school continues to be to develop responsible leadership by generating and disseminating knowledge with a global perspective. Therefore, Iscte Business School and its people – students, staff, and faculty – remains fully committed to PRME and its principles.

PRIME Leadership Accountability

At Iscte Business School - University Institute of Lisbon, accountability for responsible management education is structured as follows:

This guides the school's strategy, which is organized by the intended impacts, namely, Intellectual, Educational, and Community Ecosystem Impact. The first impact emphasizes the societal benefits of research, specifically the benefits that research brings to the economy, individual and community well-being, and the environment. The second impact focuses on continuing to inspire and support engaged learners in acquiring knowledge and developing skills on how to act at local, regional, and global levels for the well-being of people and with respect to the planet. Lastly, the school has been working towards the implementation of a systematic approach to engage its community in activities that support the required transformational actions.

Implementation of the "Impactful Five" I5 at Iscte Business School

2023 marked the beginning of the progressive implementation of the PRME 'Impactful Five' (i5) program at Iscte Business School.

In 2023, Iscte Business School began progressively implementing the PRME 'Impactful Five' (i5) program. The program sets a global agenda to prioritize innovative pedagogical approaches in leadership education, focusing on five key characteristics of playful learning: meaningful

learning, active engagement, iteration, supportive social interaction, and fostering joy and wellbeing. By integrating these principles into the educational system, the program aims to develop future leaders with comprehensive skillsets.

The first three years will emphasize scalable institutionalization, with long-term objectives of tracking and sustaining progress, ensuring that both educators and students benefit from this transformative approach. Initially piloted by some faculty at the business school, this process will soon engage the pedagogical council at the university level.

Program-Level RME Integration

Description of degree programs with RME in the program-level learning goals and assessment rubrics

Sustainable and responsible management inspires the daily activities of Iscte Business School. Among the seven undergraduate programs offered by Iscte Business School, six explicitly include RME in their learning goals. Of the 17 master's programs offered by Iscte Business School, twelve explicitly incorporate RME into their learning goals. These findings underscore the importance of reinforcing the inclusion of RME in learning goals, ensuring that what is often implicitly understood is made explicit and clearly articulated.

RME in the program-level learning goals

Sustainable and responsible management inspires the daily activities of Iscte Business School. The school recognizes its responsibility to contribute to the United Nations 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and to educate, engage, and foster a sense of responsibility that will leave a positive legacy for future generations.

During the AACSB reaccreditation process in 2022, Iscte Business School revised the learning goals of various programs (undergraduate and master's degrees). There are five core competencies for both undergraduate and master's programs, with differences in the expected level of mastery between undergraduate and master's students. Each program has a 6th competency, a technical one. Among the five core competencies of the school's programs, one specifically addresses ethics, social responsibility, and sustainability. This competency reflects the alignment of the programs with the school's mission and vision.

For the undergraduate programs the focus is in the "Identification and evaluation of issues, stakeholders and their interests surrounding corporate responsibility and/or sustainability" and "Recognize and describe ethical dilemmas".

At the master's level, the focus is to "Identify and discuss the myriad challenges surrounding corporate responsibility and/or sustainability" and "Recognize and critically reflect on ethical dilemmas"

For the PRME SIP Report 2.0 2024, the learning goals of the programs (undergraduate and master) for the 2022/2023 academic year were analyzed. Since 2022 was a transitional year, the implementation of the revised learning goals was planned for 2022/2023 academic year, though it was only fully achieved in 2023/2024.

Among the seven undergraduate programs offered by Iscte Business School, six explicitly include RME in their learning goals (Table 1).

Of the 17 master's programs offered by Iscte Business School, twelve explicitly incorporate RME into their learning goals (Table 2).

These findings underscore the importance of reinforcing the inclusion of RME in learning goals, ensuring that what is often implicitly understood is made explicit and clearly articulated.

Of the four doctorates programs Iscte Business School offers, only one has a curricular unit whose learning goals explicitly involve RME, this being the Doctor of Management (DBA). The program is offered under the Business Research Unit, the Iscte Business School research center. The specific course is called "Quantitative Research Methods in Applied Business Management." Still, other courses also cover RME topics (e.g. in the choice of papers to discuss or research topics to explore). This highlights the need to explicitly refer to RME in the learning objectives.

Dedicated Research Funding

Research funding specifically related to responsibility

Iscte Business Research Unit (BRU-Iscte) focuses on diversifying its research funding, with an emphasis on internationalization. In 2023, two notable projects were highlighted: SMITour, a European project aiming to explore the potential of Smart Industrial Tourism as a sustainable

economic activity in the Mediterranean, and SUSPITALITY/CiTUR, a project in Madeira studying sustainability determinants in the hospitality sector. In 2023, BRU-Iscte researchers participated in 39 projects, including 5 FCT-funded and 29 European projects. Twelve of these projects were coordinated by BRU-Iscte researchers, all classified under at least 1 SDG.

Iscte Business Research Unit (BRU-Iscte) actively seeks diverse pathways for research funding to strategically position itself and broaden the sources of its financial support, with a strong focus on internationalisation. Two new projects from 2023 were selected as examples for this report, which stood out in terms of research funding for responsibility.

The first project is SMITour: SMart Industrial Tourism in the Mediterranean (European project – INTERREG Euro-MED) that through transnational cooperation, SMITour aims to explore the social and economic potential of Smart Industrial Tourism (SMIT) as a sustainable economic activity that can benefit tourism actors, SMEs, industry experts, Chambers of Commerce and Industry, R&D centres, Higher Education institutions, technology providers, and local communities.

The second example is SUSPITALITY/CiTUR: A socio-technical approach to sustainability determinants in the hospitality sector in Madeira funded by University of Madeira's CiTUR research centre. The Project aims to study the sustainability determinants that impact business performance in Madeira's hotel sector – considering both the abundance of decision-makers with conflicting values and preferences involved, and the large number of sustainability determinants to be considered. A better understanding of the ways in which they are interconnected will help decision-makers create value through more informed decisions, while at the same time advancing sustainability goals.

In 2023, BRU-Iscte researchers were coordinating or participating in 39 projects, including 5 FCT-funded projects (Fundação para a Ciência e a Tecnologia is the Portuguese public agency supporting research in science, technology and innovation in all areas of knowledge.) and 29 European projects (of which 8 funded by Horizon Europe).

Of the 39 projects in which BRU - Iscte takes part, 12 are coordinated by BRU-Iscte researchers, all of which are classified with at least 1 and at most 3 SDGs. Of the 27 projects coordinated by other institutions with the participation of BRU-Iscte researchers, 17 are classified by the SDGs. The source for this information was BRU - Iscte 2023 Annual Research Report.

Required Research Reporting

Research Impact and Alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Following the practice of previous years, researchers at the Iscte Business Research Unit use the Ciência-IUL system to identify the SDGs most relevant to their scientific output. By aligning Research Impact with Sustainable Development Goals, researchers are prompted to consider how their work contributes to these objectives, enabling the institution to map the research unit's scientific production in terms of its broader focuses.

Research Impact and Alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Through its Sustainability Policy, Iscte recognises (and regulates) its responsibility as a higher education institution to contribute to the SDGs defined by the 2030 Agenda. Specifically, Iscte aims to promote research activity that operationalizes the achievement of the goals. For example, the institution allows its researchers to link specific SDGs to their scientific output, whenever they submit an entry in its proprietary information system Ciência-IUL, giving the goals visibility and relevance.

For the year 2023, Iscte Business Research Unit (BRU-Iscte) researchers have listed 137 scientific communications, 167 publications and 28 projects having connected to the SDGs. In addition, our researchers reported 63 doctoral theses concluded in 2023 (PhD and DBA programmes), also contributing to the SDGs.

As advocated previously, BRU-Iscte is working on building its interdisciplinary capacity by exploring research trends anchored on the Sustainable Development Goals within each research group and in transversal thematic lines.

Research Awards Program

In 2023, 54 BRU-Iscte Researchers were awarded the 2023 Iscte Research Awards for publications and projects published or approved the previous year (2022). 91 research works (82 scientific articles and 9 projects) were awarded a monetary prize according to BRU-Iscte

rules. Of those 82 scientific articles, 43 were coded according to to the Sustainable Development Goals meaning they are Responsible Management Education (RME) related. And out of the 9 projects that were awarded, seven were coded to at least one SDG (RME).

Scientific Awards

BRU-Iscte Scientific Awards

In 2023, 54 BRU-Iscte Researchers were awarded the 2023 Iscte Research Awards for publications and projects published or approved the previous year (2022). 91 research works (82 scientific articles and 9 projects) were awarded a monetary prize according to BRU-Iscte rules. Of those 82 scientific articles, 43 were coded according to the Sustainable Development Goals, meaning they are Responsible Management Education (RME) related. Partnership Approaches for RME

Iscte Business School - University Institute of Lisbon partners with external stakeholders to advance responsible management education through 5 different approaches:

Collaborative Change Action

Iscte Business School 11 e 12 Horas de Gestão

The "11 and 12 Hours of Management" initiative offers secondary schools in Lisbon and surrounding areas the opportunity to engage with the academic and business environments through a sustainability-focused challenge that raises awareness of the UN's 2030 Agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals. This event fosters collaboration between academia, business, and civil society to positively impact communities, organizations, and the future of young people.

On March 24, 2023, the "11 and 12 Hours of Management" event organized by Iscte Business School, in association with the MEO Kalorama festival, took place. This event challenged 11th and 12th-grade students to develop a project in the field of management.

ISCTE Business School organizes this initiative annually for high schools and colleges across the country, targeting 11th and 12th-grade students in the fields of Socioeconomic Sciences and Natural Sciences. This year, students were invited to learn more about the MEO Kalorama festival and to draw inspiration from its three fundamental pillars—Music, Art, and Sustainability—to develop their own projects. One of the festival's main goals in partnering with this initiative is to engage younger generations and raise awareness about creating community-involving events that respect the environment, aligning with the UN's 2030 Agenda and Sustainable Development Goals, as seen in the organization of MEO Kalorama. Another motivation is the creation of new audiences, which is why this year's winners are rewarded with festival tickets and a technical visit to the event site.

The 11 and 12 Hours of Management games at ISCTE Business School are primarily held for invited schools, and the latest edition had the participation of around 340 students from 30 high schools/colleges. Simultaneously, the Teachers Upgrade initiative was conducted, aimed at secondary school teachers who accompanied the teams on the day of the event.

Knowledge Translation and Dissemination

SEED Project - Financial Literacy Sessions

The SEED Project demonstrates the School's students, faculty and staff engagement towards co-creating societal impact. The project's aim is to instill financial leteracy sessions to public school students from 9th to 12th grade. The partnership with Lisbon's municipality embodies the principles of responsible teaching and government-academia collaboration while promoting impact in the community.

Lisbon City Council initiated the SEED Project in 2023 and has partnered with Iscte Business School. This initiative demonstrates the School's students, faculty and staff engagement towards co-creating societal impact. The project's aim is to instill entrepreneurial skills in public school students from 9th to 12th grade through six lines of action, including the development of an entrepreneurship laboratory, workshops, financial literacy sessions, and support for student projects.

A key aspect of the SEED Project is its focus on financial literacy, some sessions were led by Iscte Business School with the high commitment of the finance student organization ITIC (Iscte Trading & Investment Club), the scientific coordination by faculty, and the operational coordination by school staff. The program began in the 2022/2023 school year, impacting 93 students in its pilot phase. By the 2023/2024 academic year, the project expanded to 18 classes with a total of 399 students. ITIC provided two sessions for each class that covered essential financial topics using practical examples and interactive games.

The project aligns with Sustainable Development Goals 4 (Quality Education), 10 (Reduced Inequalities), and 17 (Partnerships for the Goals). It provides education on topics beyond the standard curriculum, aiming for a lasting impact on the students' lives. By welcoming students from diverse backgrounds, SEED addresses educational inequalities and promotes inclusive financial market participation. The partnership with Lisbon's municipality embodies the principles of responsible teaching and government-academia collaboration while promoting impact in the community.

Overall, the SEED Project has evolved to become a model of innovative education, fostering a community of ethically, responsibly, and sustainably minded individuals. The positive assessment from all stakeholders, including students, faculty, and partners, underscores the project's success in enhancing engagement and producing tangible outcomes in the realm of financial literacy and entrepreneurship.

External Community Dialogue

The PRME Champions represent a group of dedicated business and management schools from across the PRME membership, committed to working collaboratively to develop and promote activities that address shared barriers for the PRME community, and which deliver value for business and society at large. Previous collaborations attributed to the PRME Champions include the Climate Literacy Training for Business Schools, the Blueprint for SDG Integration, the SDG Library, and more.

The focus of the 2023 Champions cycle was on action leadership to inspire the global community, specifically through the Inspirational Guide on SDG Integration on Research, Curriculum, and Partnerships, which serves as a repository of inspiring examples that will build on the work of the existing Blueprint for SDG Integration. A unique feature of the 2023 cycle was the engagement in The Impactful Five (i5) Project, a knowledge-sharing and peer-learning project with the aim of future-proofing higher education institutions with novel pedagogies and practices that inspire creativity and authenticity and underpin sustainable development across all disciplines of business education. The 2023 Champions participated in a series of workshops throughout the year to source, develop, and implement innovative pedagogies, inspired by the Impactful Five Characteristics outlined in partnership with The LEGO Foundation.

Besides the dialogue with the PRME Champions community, the school is represented by Associate Dean for Engagement and Impact, Ana Simaens, at the Guardians of GRLI Council, which works to uphold the vision, mission and operating ethos of the Globally Responsible Leadership Initiative (GRLI) and to ensure all three elements (Board of Trustees, Council of Partners, Support Centre) are actively supported, acted upon and visible in the GRLI and in all related activity.

Iscte Business School and the world's leading business schools form the core of the Global Business School Network (GBSN). The network is not only linked to universities but also to companies, governments and NGOs working together to improve access to quality education, locally relevant management and entrepreneurship.

Each organization that is part of GBSN shares a common vision, so that the developing world has the talent it needs to generate prosperity. GBSN offers global visibility, international exposure and a certified collaborative structure. Through its programs, events and partnerships, all GBSN members demonstrate a commitment to the mission.

Collaborative Problem Solving

Iscte Business School Ecopreneurship Hackthon

The partnership between MEO Kalorama and Iscte Business School is an example of the partnership between Business and Academia, which makes it possible to develop students' knowledge on the topics of sustainability and entrepreneurship in a creative way, with the possibility of finding solutions to a real challenges and even winning tickets to a festival.

Iscte Business School proudly presented its 1st Ecopreneuship Hackathon, an immersive and intensive 12h competition that sought to stimulate students to face the real challenges of the world of sustainable entrepreneurship, on November 16 and 17, 2023. To take part, students formed teams of three and responded to an Ecopreneurship challenge proposed by MEO Kalorama, putting their creative and entrepreneurial skills into practice for 12 hours in a dedicated room provided by Iscte. At the end, each team presented their project, via a Pitch, to a panel of expert judges made up of members of academia and organizations linked to the topic in question. Prizes were awarded, with 1st place winning tickets to the Meo Kalorama 2024 Festival, along with other prizes.
